House Order.

The following House Order (approved by the committees on Rules of the two branches, acting concurrently) was considered forthwith and adopted in concurrence, as follows, to wit:

Ordered, That the clerks of the House of Representatives and the Senate be authorized to receive the final report of the joint oversight committee (established under House order No. 4835 of the 191st General Court) to make an investigation and study of the Soldiers' Home in Holyoke COVID-19 outbreak, said report having been due on March 31, 2021.

The rules were suspended, on motion of Mr. O'Connor, and the order was considered forthwith and adopted, in concurrence.

Adjournment in Memory of Virginia Valiela.

The Senator from Plymouth and Barnstable, Ms. Moran, presented a request that when the Senate adjourns today it do so in memory of Virginia Valiela.

Ms. Virginia Valiela was a resident of Falmouth, environmental activist, and leader in local government who passed away on May 15, 2021 at the age of 79.

Ms. Virginia Valiela was married to her husband Ivan and was mother to three daughters.

Ms. Virginia Valiela was a leader in Falmouth's local government and in organizations that worked in the community and a mentor to individuals volunteering for public service. Starting in 1981, she served as commissioner of the Falmouth Department of Public Works, overseeing the construction of Falmouth's municipal sewer system. From 1986-2007, she served on the Falmouth Board of Selectmen, and afterwards she served both on the board of The 300 Committee's Land Trust and as a member of the Falmouth Water Quality Management Committee, leading the implementation of improved, cost-efficient means of nitrogen mitigation to the benefit of Falmouth and the Upper Cape.

Ms. Virginia Valiela worked throughout her life as an environmental activist. Her work included organizing Falmouth's first paper drive in 1970, reforming the water management of the Massachusetts Military Reservation, and advocating for the construction of the regional transfer station. Her efforts have touched every aspect of the environmental conservation and stewardship effort that exists today in Falmouth and the Upper Cape.

Ms. Virginia Valiela will forever be remembered in Falmouth as a visionary and leader who saw the urgency and importance of protecting our environment, and her legacy will continue to impact Falmouth's development towards a sustainable future for decades to come.

Accordingly, as a mark of respect to the memory of Virginia Valiela, at twenty-four minutes past eleven o'clock A.M., on motion of Mr. O'Connor, the Senate adjourned to
