### PAPER FROM THE HOUSE.

The Senate Bill relative to extending certain COVID-19 measures adopted during the state of emergency (Senate, No. 2472),-- came from the House passed to be engrossed, in concurrence, with an amendment, striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the text contained on House document numbered 3874.

COVID-19 measures,--extension.

Mr. Tarr moved that the Senate NON-concur in the House amendments and asked for a committee of conference on the disagreeing votes of the two branches; and Senators Rodrigues, Friedman and O'Connor were appointed to the committee on the part of the Senate.

The bill was returned to the House endorsed accordingly.

### Suspension of Senate Rule 38A

### PAPER FROM THE HOUSE

Emergency Preamble Adopted; Engrossed Bill Enacted.

An engrossed Bill relative to extending certain COVID-19 measures adopted during the state of emergency (see Senate, No. 2475), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage and containing an emergency preamble,—was laid before the Senate; and, a separate vote being taken in accordance with the requirements of Article LXVII of the Amendments to the Constitution, the preamble was adopted, in concurrence, by a vote of 2 to 0.

COVID-19 measures,--extension.

The bill was signed by the Acting President, (Mr. Brownsberger) and sent to the House for enactment.

Subsequently, the bill, which originated in the Senate, came from the House with the endorsement that it had been enacted in that branch.

The Senate then passed the bill to be enacted; and it was signed by the Acting President (Mr. Brownsberger) and laid before the Governor for his approbation.
