On motion of Mr. Fattman, the Senate insisted on its amendment and concurred in the appointment of a committee of conference; and Senators Rush, Velis and Tarr were appointed on the part of the Senate.

The bill was returned to the House endorsed accordingly.

## Adjournment in Memory of Paula Green.

The Senator from Hampshire, Franklin and Worcester, Ms. Comerford, moved that when the Senate adjourns today it do so in memory of Paula Green.

Paula Green, an internationally renowned peacebuilder from Leverett, passed from this life on February 21. Paula's death is mourned and her life celebrated by people around the world.

A trained psychotherapist, Paula championed a groundbreaking approach to conflict resolution across political divides focused on helping people see our common humanity. Some called it a "head to heart" approach which allowed for deeper relationships and healing.

Her beloved husband, Jim Perkins noted that Paula was "a brave, passionate, and highly skilled practitioner – a master of finding the commonalities among people beyond intellect."

Paula founded the Karuna Center for Peacebuilding where much of her work led her

to intense conflict zones, including Bosnia, Rwanda, Nigeria, Sri Lanka and the Middle East.

She said of her work, "I found myself no longer willing to be a passive witness to the suffering caused by armed conflict and the unbridled misuse of power and privilege."

Paula was also a founding director of the Conflict Transformation Across Cultures program at the School for International Training in Brattleboro, Vermont – a program that has taught aspiring peacebuilders from around the world.

Most recently, Paula launched an effort called Hands Across the Hills in response to the 2016 U.S. election cycle. It aimed to spark dialogue among liberals and conservatives from western Massachusetts and Kentucky.

In a 2019 story about Hands Across the Hills, The New York Times wrote, "Dr. Green applied a basic rule of psychology: Once people feel heard, their dignity had been acknowledged and the facts of their lives taken seriously, it is easier to take on harder topics like politics."

In a tribute posted to its website, the Karuna Center notes that Paula was "a powerful force for change" who "will remain a catalyst for peace, having inspired generations of peacebuilders to build bridges across seemingly intractable divides with compassion, bravery and a profound sense of justice."

School for International Training President Dr. Sophia Howlett noted, "Paula leaves a rich legacy of teaching and writing that will continue to inspire social change for years to come."

In a Caring Bridge entry two days before her death, Paula noted that cancer had reentered her body like a "freight train." She continued, "I have had a full measure of a wonderful full life. Eighty-four is a ripe number and of course we only want more."

Paula closed with love noting that she and Jim "have been cradled in [their] community for 40 years in Leverett."

The loss of Paula is felt ever more deeply amid the ongoing and anguishing attack on Ukraine.

Those who have loved and learned from Paula must now take up her life's work of peacebuilding and for what Jim noted must be "powerful work for a more kind and just society" for all.

Accordingly, as a mark of respect to the memory of Paula Green, at nineteen minutes before twelve o'clock noon, on motion of Mr. Brownsberger, the Senate adjourned to meet again on Thursday next at eleven o'clock A.M.
