Monday, July 11, 2022.

PAPER FROM THE HOUSE

Emergency Preamble Adopted.

An engrossed Bill making appropriations for fiscal year 2022 to provide for supplementing certain existing appropriations and for certain other activities and projects (see House, No. 4932), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage and containing an emergency preamble,-- was laid before the Senate; and, a separate vote being taken in accordance with the requirements of Article LXVII of the Amendments to the Constitution, the preamble was adopted in concurrence, by a vote of 3 to 0.

Supplemental appropriations.

The bill was signed by the Acting President (Mr. DiDomenico) and sent to the House for enactment.

Reports of a Committee.

By Mr. Rodrigues, for the committee on Ways and Means, that the Senate Bill protecting the health and safety of puppies and kittens in cities and towns (Senate, No. 1322),-- ought to pass, with an amendment substituting a new draft with the same title (Senate, No. 2994).

There being no objection, the rules were suspended, on motion of Mr. Tarr, and the bill was read a second time and was amended, as recommended by the committee on Ways and Means.

After remarks, the bill (Senate, No. 2994) was then ordered to a third reading, read a third time and passed to be engrossed.

Sent to the House for concurrence.

By Mr. Rodrigues, for the committee on Ways and Means, that the House Bill further regulating the enforcement of illegal hunting practices (House, No. 4442),-- ought to pass, with an amendment inserting in place thereof the text of Senate document numbered 2993.

There being no objection, the rules were suspended, on motion of Mr. Moore, and the bill was read a second time and was amended, as recommended by the committee on Ways and Means.

After remarks, the bill, as amended, was then ordered to a third reading, read a third time and passed to be engrossed, in concurrence, with the amendment.

Illegal hunting practices.

An engrossed Bill making appropriations for fiscal year 2022 to provide for supplementing certain existing appropriations and for certain other activities and projects (see House, No. 4932) (which originated in the House), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was passed to be enacted and signed by the Acting President (Mr. DiDomenico) and laid before the Governor for his approbation.

A Bill expanding protections for reproductive rights (House, No. 4594,-- on Senate, No. 1372 and House, No. 2264),-- was read.

Procedural order.

Ms. Friedman moved that when the Senate considers the bill that the bill be amended by striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the text of Senate document numbered 2996.

Order Adopted.

Ms. Friedman presented the following order, to wit:

Ordered, That notwithstanding Senate Rule 7 or any other rule to the contrary, the House Bill expanding protections for reproductive rights (House, No. 4954) (Ms. Friedman having recommended that the bill be amended by striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the text of Senate document numbered 2996) shall be placed in the Orders of the Day for a second reading on Wednesday, July 13, 2022.

All amendments shall be filed electronically in the office of the Clerk of the Senate by 5:00 P.M., on Tuesday, July 12, 2022. All such amendments shall be second-reading amendments to the proposed new text (Friedman) (Senate, No. 2996), but further amendments in the third degree to such amendments shall be in order. The Clerk shall further specify the procedure and format for filing all amendments, consistent with this order.

After the bill as amended is ordered to a third reading, it shall immediately be read a third time and the question shall then immediately be on passing it to be engrossed, and no amendments shall be in order at the third reading of the bill unless recommended by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading.

The rules were suspended, on motion of Ms. Chandler, and the order was considered forthwith and adopted.

The bill will be placed in the Orders of the Day for Wednesday, July 13, 2022, for a second reading with the amendment pending.

There being no objection, at twelve minutes before twelve o'clock noon, the Chair (Mr. DiDomenico) declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair; and, at twenty-five minutes before three o'clock P.M., the Senate reassembled, Mr. Rodrigues in the Chair.

PAPERS FROM THE HOUSE.

A Bill dedicating the grove at Heritage State Park in the city of Fall River as the David Almond Grove, in honor of the late David Almond (House, No. 4832,-- on petition),-- was read.

There being no objection, the rules were suspended, on motion of Mr. Tarr, and the bill was read a second time and ordered to a third reading.

The House Bill preserving open space in the Commonwealth (House, No. 851),-came from the House with the endorsement that the House had NON-concurred in the Senate amendment (striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof

the text contained in Senate document numbered 2831), and had asked for a committee of conference on the disagreeing votes of the two branches; and that Representatives Balser of Newton, O'Day of West Boylston and Gifford of Wareham had been appointed the committee on the part of the House.

On motion of Mr. Tarr, the Senate insisted on its amendment and concurred in the appointment of a committee of conference; and Senators DiDomenico, Eldridge and Tarr were appointed on the part of the Senate.

The bill was returned to the House endorsed accordingly.
