Mr. Collins in the Chair, an engrossed Bill providing for the terms of certain bonds to be issued by the Commonwealth (see House Bill, printed in House, No. 5213), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage and containing an emergency preamble,-- was laid before the Senate; and, a separate vote being taken in accordance with the requirements of Article LXVII of the Amendments to the Constitution, the preamble was adopted in concurrence, by a vote of 3 to 0.
