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# JOURNAL OF THE SENATE

Monday, November 21, 2022.

Met at four minutes past eleven o'clock A.M.

Students from the fifth grade class from the Oak Street Elementary School in Franklin led the President, members, guests and staff in the recitation of the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

## Distinguished Guests.

There being no objection, the President introduced, in the rear of the Chamber, the 5<sup>th</sup> grade class from the Oak Street Elementary School in Franklin. The students were on a field trip to the State House learning about the different aspects of state government. They were also guests of Senator Rausch and Representative Roy of Franklin, both of whom addressed the students from the Rostrum. The students were welcomed with applause and they withdrew from the Chamber.

#### Communications.

#### PAPERS FROM THE HOUSE.

Petitions were severally referred, in concurrence, as follows, to wit:

Comerford (with the approval of the mayor and city council) that the city of Northampton be authorized to require new and substantially remodeled or rehabilitated buildings to use electricity for all building energy needs;

## Emergency Preamble.

Mr. Collins in the Chair, an engrossed Bill prohibiting license revocation for student loan default (see House, No. 4339, amended), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage and containing an emergency preamble,--was laid before the Senate; and, a separate vote being taken in accordance with the requirements of Article LXVII of the Amendments to the Constitution, the preamble was adopted in concurrence, by a vote of 2 to 0.

The bill was signed by the Acting President (Mr. Collins) (having been appointed by the President, under authority conferred by Senate Rule 4, to perform the duties of the Chair) and sent to the House for enactment.

### Matters Taken Out of the Orders of the Day.

There being no objection, the following matters were taken out of the Orders of the Day and considered as follows:

The Senate Bill authorizing the town of Andover to grant additional licenses for the sale of alcoholic beverages not to be drunk on the premises (Senate, No. 2854),-- was read a third time.

Pending the question on passing the bill to be engrossed, Mr. Finegold presented an amendment substituting a new draft entitled "An Act authorizing the town of Andover to grant 7 additional licenses for the sale of all alcoholic beverages not to be drunk on the premises" (Senate, No. 3139).

# The amendment was adopted. The bill (Senate, No. 3139) was then passed to be engrossed. Sent to the House for concurrence.

The Senate Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Clara Bett, an employee of the trial court of the commonwealth (its title having been changed by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading) (Senate, No. 3117),-- was read a third time and passed to be engrossed.

The House Bill amending the charter of the city of Methuen (its title having been changed by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading) (House, No. 4274),-- was read a third time and passed to be engrossed, in concurrence.

The House Bill relative to private street betterment assessments in the city of Worcester (House, No. 4327),-- was read a second time, ordered to a third reading, read a third time and passed to be engrossed, in concurrence, its title having been
