Thursday, April 20, 2023.

Met at twelve minutes past eleven o'clock A.M. (Mr. Collins in the Chair) (having been appointed by the President, under authority conferred by Senate Rule 4, to perform the duties of the Chair).

PAPERS FROM THE HOUSE

Engrossed Bill.

An engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Hollie Barter, an employee of the Department of Children and Families (see House, No. 3713) (which originated in the House), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was passed to be enacted and signed by the Acting President (Mr. Collins) and laid before the Governor for her approbation.

Emergency Preamble Adopted.

An engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Christopher Trigilio, an employee of the trial court of the commonwealth (see Senate, No. 2376), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage and containing an emergency preamble,-- was laid before the Senate; and, a separate vote being taken in accordance with the requirements of Article LXVII of the Amendments to the Constitution, the preamble was adopted in concurrence, by a vote of 2 to 0.

The bill was signed by the Acting President (Mr. Collins) and sent to the House for enactment.

Boxer protection.

A petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 2381) of Michael D. Brady for legislation to establish boxer protection and a safe and regulated environment for professional combat sports in Massachusetts,-- came from the House with endorsement that the House concurred in the suspension of Joint Rule 12; and had NON-concurred in the reference to the committee on Public Safety and Homeland Security. The petition bore the further endorsement that the matter had been referred to the committee on Economic Development and Emerging Technologies.

On motion of Mr. Tarr, the Senate receded from its reference to the committee on Public Safety and Homeland Security and concurred in the reference to the committee on Economic Development and Emerging Technologies.

Report of Committee.
