Thursday, September 28, 2023.

Met at twenty-three minutes past eleven o'clock A.M. (Mr. Brownsberger in the Chair) (having been appointed by the President, under authority conferred by Senate Rule 4, to perform the duties of the Chair).

The Chair (Mr. Brownsberger), members, guests and staff then recited the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

There being no objection, the President handed the gavel to Mr. Oliveira for the purpose of an introduction. Mr. Oliveira then introduced the Ambassador of the Republic of Poland to the United States Marek Magierowski. Ambassador Magierowski began his service as Ambassador to the United States in November 2021 and previously worked for the Chancellory of the President of the Republic of Poland as an expert on public diplomacy, Undersecretary of State at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the Repiblic of Poland to the State of Israel. The Senate welcomed him with applause. Ambassador Magierowski briefly addressed the Senate, signed the guestbook and withdrew from the Chamber.

Emergency Preamble Adopted.

An engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Matthew McRae, an employee

of the department of state police (see House, No. 4085), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage and containing an emergency preamble,-- was laid before the Senate; and, a separate vote being taken in accordance with the requirements of Article LXVII of the Amendments to the Constitution, the preamble was adopted in concurrence, by a vote of 12 to 0.

The bill was signed by the Acting President (Mr. Brownsberger) and sent to the House for enactment.

Engrossed Bills.

An engrossed Bill to improve the Commonwealth's competitiveness, affordability, and equity (see House, No. 4104) (which originated in the House), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage,-- was laid before the Senate, the question being on passing the bill to be enacted.
