Thursday, October 19, 2023.

Met according to adjournment at one o'clock P.M. (Mr. Brownsberger in the Chair) (having been appointed by the President, under authority conferred by Senate Rule 4, to perform the duties of the Chair).

The Chair (Mr. Brownsberger), members, guests and staff then recited the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Distinguished Guests.

There being no objection, during consideration of the Orders of the Day, the Chair (Mr. Brownsberger) handed the gavel to Mr. Rush for the purpose of an introduction. Mr. Rush then introduced, in the rear of the Chamber, the Commanding Officer of the USS Constitution, Billie J. Farrell. Commander Farrell was a 2004 Naval Academy graduate and became the first woman to command USS Constitution in 2022. Commander Farrell is the 77th Commanding Officer of the USS Constitution and has emphasized her focus on strengthening the legacy of the ship, its history, and telling the Navy story. Commander Farrell was accompanied by President and CEO of the USS Constitution, Dennis J. Langwell and Representative Daniel J. Ryan of Charlestown. They were also guests of Senator DiDomenico. The group was visiting the State House in recognition of the 248th birthday of the United States Navy, on October 13, 2023. Commander Farrell briefly addressed the Senate, was applauded for her service, signed the guestbook and withdrew from the Chamber.

Pending the question on ordering the bill to a third reading, Mr. Rush moved that the bill be amended by striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the text of Senate document numbered 2455.

The amendment was adopted.

The bill, as amended, was then ordered to a third reading.

There being no objection, the rules were suspended, on motion of the same Senator, and the bill was read a third time and passed to be engrossed, in concurrence, with the amendment.

Sent to the House for concurrence in the amendment.

The House Bill relative to salary range transparency (House, No. 4109),-- was read a second time.

After remarks, pending the question on adoption of the amendment previously recommended by the committee on Senate Ways and Means, striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the text of Senate document numbered 2468, and pending the question on ordering the bill to a third reading, Mr. Rodrigues moved that the proposed new text be amended in section 1, by striking out, in line 17, the word "supplement" and inserting in place thereof the following words:- "separate supplement";

In said section 1, by inserting after the word "report", in line 18, the following words:-

Dedham,-- charter.

In section 5 by striking out, in line 111, the word "supplement" and inserting in place thereof the following words:- "separate supplement"; and

The amendment was adopted.

The Ways and Means amendment, as amended, was then adopted.

The bill, as, amended, was then ordered to a third reading and read a third time.
