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JOURNAL OF THE SENATE

Thursday, October 26, 2023.

Met at four minutes past one o'clock P.M. (Ms. Friedman in the Chair) (having been appointed by the President, under authority conferred by Senate Rule 4, to perform the duties of the Chair).

The Chair (Ms. Friedman), members, guests and staff then recited the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

There being no objection, the Chair (Ms. Friedman) handed the gavel to Mr. O'Connor for the purpose of an introduction. Mr. O'Connor then introduced, in the rear of the Chamber, the 5th grade class from the Eames Way School in Marshfield. The students were on a field trip to the State House learning about the different aspects of state government, and had just finished a Duck Tour around the city. The Senate welcomed them with applause and they withdrew from the Chamber.

The Senate Bill to increase access to disposable menstrual products (Senate, No. 1381),-- was read a second time.

After remarks, pending the question on adoption of the amendment previously recommended by the committee on Ways and Means, substituting a new draft with the same title (Senate, No. 2481), and pending the main question on ordering the bill to a third reading, Mr. Rodrigues moved to amend the proposed new draft in section 2, by striking out, in line 21, the words "Subject to appropriation, every primary and secondary" and inserting in place thereof the following words:- "Every elementary and secondary public school"; and

In said section 2, in proposed section 3A of chapter 71, by striking out subsection (c). The amendment was adopted.

The Ways and Means amendment, as amended, was then adopted.

The bill (Senate, No. 2481, amended) was then ordered to a third reading and read a third time.

The Senator from Norfolk, Plymouth and Bristol, Mr. Timilty, moved that when the Senate adjourns today it do so in memory of Donald J. Barry, Jr.

Donald J. Barry, Jr., a longtime resident of both Milton and Falmouth, passed away on June 15, 2023, at the age of 76.

A longtime Senior Vice President and Counsel for Citizens Bank in Boston, successor to the former Neworld Bank and Charlestown Savings Bank, Donald retired in 2009 after a forty-year career in the banking industry focusing on bank law and regulatory issues.

Don graduated from Boston College High School, Boston College, and Suffolk University Law School. In addition to being an attorney, he was a member of the Society Moment of silence.

Furthermore, Don ascended to the chairmanship of the board of the Laboure Center serving in this leadership capacity for three years.

On a personal note, Don was a seasonal resident of Acapesket Beach in Falmouth on Cape Cod since 1978. Here, Don enjoyed many happy years having drinks and dinner with family and friends at that very special place. He was an avid reader and loved classic movies. He enjoyed traveling especially to San Francisco and New York City. He will be remembered for being a loyal friend and sharp conversationalist.

Beloved son of the late Donald J. Barry and Gertrude G. Barry, and brother of the late Bruce F. Barry of Westwood, he is survived by his sister-in-law Margaret (Peggy) A. Barry of Asheville, North Carolina, nephew David F. Barry of Austin, Texas, and his niece Christine Barry Rains and her husband Michael. Additionally, Don was Godfather and beloved "Nonno" to Evelyn M. Rains and Andrew M. Rains of Asheville, North Carolina. Don is survived by his legions of friends.

He will be truly missed by those who knew and loved him.
