PAPER FROM THE HOUSE.

Emergency Preamble Adopted.

An engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Cheryl Thouin, an employee of the Hampshire county sheriff's office (see House, No. 4233) having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage and containing an emergency preamble,-- was laid before the Senate; and, a separate vote being taken in accordance with the requirements of Article LXVII of the Amendments to the Constitution, the preamble was adopted in concurrence, by a vote of 2 to 0.

The bill was signed by the Acting President (Mr. Collins) and sent to the House for enactment.

Recess.

There being no objection, at seventeen minutes before twelve o'clock noon, the Chair (Mr. Collins) declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair; and at three minutes before four o'clock P.M., the Senate reassembled, Mr. Brownsberger in the Chair (having been appointed by the President, under authority conferred by Senate Rule 4, to perform the duties of the Chair).

Ms. Creem presented the following order, to wit:

Ordered, That notwithstanding Senate Rule 7 or any other rule to the contrary, the House Bill modernizing firearm laws (House, No. 4139), shall be considered for debate in the Senate session of Thursday, February 1, 2024, as a paper from the House, at which time the amendment offered by the Senator from Norfolk and Middlesex, Ms. Creem, striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the text of Senate document numbered 2572, will be considered with the main question being on ordering the bill to a third reading, with the amendment pending.
