Ordered, That the special joint committee shall consist of 8 members as follows: 4 members of the senate, 3 of whom shall be appointed by the president of the senate and 1 of whom shall be appointed by the minority leader of the senate; and 4 members of the house of representatives, 3 of whom shall be appointed by the speaker of the house and 1 of whom shall be appointed by the minority leader of the house.
