JOURNAL OF THE SENATE

Thursday, September 5, 2024.

Met at two minutes past eleven o'clock A.M. (Mr. Collins in the Chair) (having been appointed by the President, under authority conferred by Senate Rule 4, to perform the duties of the Chair).

The Chair (Mr. Collins), members, guests and staff then recited the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Distinguished Guests.

There being no objection, the following guests were introduced:

The Chair (Mr. Collins) handed the gavel to Mr. Velis for the purpose of an introduction. Mr. Velis then introduced, in the rear of the Chamber, members of the State Partnership Program between the Massachusetts National Guard and Paraguay. Among the group were: Paraguay's Minister of Defense Oscar Gonzalez, the Adjutant General of Massachusetts, Major General Gary Keefe, and other members of the Massachusetts National Guard. This partnership was established in 2003 with a goal to promote long-term, enduring and mutually beneficial security relationships with friendly and allied nations around the globe and to exchange military skills and experience, share defense knowledge, and enhance partnership capacity and further mutual security cooperation. The Senate welcomed them with applause, Minister of Defense Gonzalez addressed the Chamber from the Rostrum, signed the guestbook, and withdrew from the Chamber.

The Chair (Mr. Collins) handed the gavel to Mr. Payano for the purpose of an introduction. Mr. Payano then introduced, in the rear of the Chamber, a delegation of local officials, leaders of the Presidential Committee for Decentralization and Balanced Development, and the Korea Evaluation Institute of Industrial Technology. The group was taking part in a visit that was organized by the South Korea Ministry of Trade, Industry and Energy that would allow them to study how Massachusetts supports regional development and gateway cities. They were hosted by Jeevan Ramapriya, the Executive Director of the Massachusetts Office of International Trade and Investment, and Andre Leroux of MassINC. The Senate welcomed them with applause and they withdrew from the Chamber.

Emergency Preamble Adopted.

An engrossed Bill to rename the Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commission, MassAbility, to reflect the self-determination and limitless possibilities of people with disabilities (see House, No. 4528, amended), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage and containing an emergency preamble,-- was laid before the Senate; and, a separate vote being taken in accordance with the requirements of Article LXVII of the Amendments to the Constitution, the preamble was adopted in concurrence, by a vote of 2 to 0.
