# Adjournment in Memory of Mrs. Lorraine Patricia Steele.

The Senator from Suffolk, Mr. Collins, presented a request that when the Senate adjourns today, it do so in memory of Mrs. Lorraine Patricia Steele.

Mrs. Lorraine Patricia Steele (Farrel) of Boston, a beloved wife, community advocate, and neighborhood champion, passed away comfortably and peacefully at home on Saturday, July 19, 2025, at the young age of 71, after an 18-month valiantly fought battle with a rare

form of cancer. There are many ways to describe Lorraine: smart, ambitious, driven, self-directed, disciplined, hardworking, with an aptitude for detail and organizing events. She was warm and engaging with a ready and infectious laugh, an accomplished cook, a great dancer, highly social, selfless, outgoing, and caring. She brightened the lives of everyone who interacted with her.

Lorraine was born May 12, 1954, to Edgar and Betsy (Betty) Farrel in Wiesbaden, Germany, where her dad was stationed as a U.S. Air Force fighter pilot. Upon discharge, the family moved California, where her dad pursued his career in the aerospace industry, working on several important projects for the space shuttle and other NASA programs.

Lorraine spent her early years in Sacramento and later moved to Southern California, graduating with honors from Newbury Park High School in 1972. After a year working at Yellowstone National Park, she began studying foreign languages at the University of Hawaii, aiming to become a UN translator. There, she met and married her first husband, Mark, before relocating to Boston. After their divorce, Lorraine worked as an administrative assistant and later became Deloitte's first para-professional Research Associate. She met her current husband, Lee, there in 1981. Lorraine earned a BS in Accounting from Northeastern, graduating Summa Cum Laude in 1985, and completed her MBA at Babson in 1986, the year she and Lee married.

In addition to her professional and vineyard management responsibilities, Lorraine was a passionate and active participant in local Boston non-profits, including the St. Botolph Neighborhood Association (VP, Treasurer, and Social Chairman), the Southwest Corridor Park Conservancy as a founding Board member and its principal fundraiser, the Jimmy Fund/Pan Mass Challenge Bike-a-Thon for 13 years, BUILD of Greater Boston and other non-profits.

An avid gardener, she organized many beautification projects along the SWCP as well as maintaining the gardens surrounding her building, which won the prestigious Magnolia Award from the Garden Club of the Back Bay in 2024. She was also the organizer of many memorable social events with friends and neighbors in the Durham Street area. Many referred to her as the de facto "Mayor" of Durham Street.

Lorraine is survived by her loving husband, Lee; also by her two brothers, Bill and Jim Farrel; her seven nieces and nephews, and countless grand-nieces and nephews.

Lorraine was taken from us at too young an age, but we will fondly remember her caring, selfless, and vibrant spirit that created lasting memories for which we are eternally grateful. Many folks have said that she changed their life for the better. May she rest in peace. Mrs. Steele will be missed by all who had the pleasure of knowing her.
