A Bill relative to any vacancy among town meeting members in Milford (House, No. 4171,— on petition) [Local approval received],— was read.

There being no objection, the rules were suspended, on motion of Mr. Durant, and the bill was read a second time and ordered to a third reading.

A petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 4783) of Lindsay N. Sabadosa relative to the rights of individuals experiencing homelessness,-- was referred, in concurrence, under suspension of Joint Rule 12, to the committee on The Judiciary.

The House Bill relative to assault and battery upon a transit worker (House, No. 4645, amended),-- came from the House with the endorsement that the House had concurred in the Senate amendment striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the text of Senate document numbered 2697, with a further amendment by striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the following:

Transit worker,-- assault and battery.

Section 13D of chapter 265 of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2024 Official Edition, is hereby amended by striking out the first paragraph and inserting in place thereof the following paragraph:-

Whoever commits an assault and battery, including assault and battery by means of a bodily substance, upon an public employee, public transit worker or any transit worker contracted or employed to operate public transit services, when such person is engaged in the performance of their duties at the time of such assault and battery, shall be punished by imprisonment for not less than 90 days nor more than 2 ½ years in a house of correction or by a fine of not less than \$500 nor more than \$5,000, or both. For the purposes of this section, "bodily substance" shall mean any human secretion, discharge or emission including, but not limited to, blood, saliva, mucous, semen, urine or feces (as corrected BTR).

The rules were suspended, on motion of Mr. Durant, and the further House amendment was considered forthwith and adopted, in concurrence.

Engrossed Bill.

An engrossed Bill relative to assault and battery upon a transit worker (see House, No. 4645, amended) (which originated in the House), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was passed to be enacted and signed by the Acting President (Mr. Brownsberger) and laid before the Governor for her approbation.
