Remarks of Senator Nick Collins.

Thank you, Madam President. And through you to the members. I rise in support of this legislation that I am proud to have jointly sponsored with the state representative from Charlestown, Dan Ryan, who was my co-chair on the Walsh-Kennedy Commission. I want to thank the Senate President for prioritizing this important piece of legislation, the Chair of Ways and Means, and particularly the Senator from Belmont, Senator Brownsberger.

Remarks of Senator
Nick Collins.

On March 16, 2014, not far from here in the State House, sparks from unpermitted welding work ignited a fast moving nine alarm fire on Beacon Street. The fire sent 18 people to the hospital and took the lives of Boston Fire Lieutenant Edward Walsh and firefighter Michael Kennedy. Lieutenant Walsh, age 43, was a husband, a father of three and a leader

in his firehouse. His wife, Kristen and their children, Morgan, Dylan and Griffin have carried his legacy forward. Firefighter Kennedy was a Marine Corps veteran, a mentor and a public servant whose commitment to helping others extended well beyond the firehouse. These are not just names on a commission or bill. They were sons, brothers, husbands, fathers, friends and firefighters who spent their lives looking out for others. Thousands of people came to say goodbye to them. Charity events held in their honor, foundations set up in their name. But the commitment to their legacies did not end there. In 2018, members of the Walsh and Kennedy families, firefighters, labor leaders, public safety stakeholders came to the State House to testify about the need for change and to ensure that a tragedy like this could not happen again. A special commission was formed to study cutting, welding and hot works safety. I was fortunate to be appointed to that commission, and serving on has been nothing less than transformative experience. We heard directly from firefighters, safety professionals, workers and families about what went wrong when the system failed and what needed to change.

Legislation we have now passed in the Senate previously in this new element that has passed the House, that is before us today, carries those lessons forward. It establishes clear statewide standards for hot works training and certification, including in-person initial training, continued education, multilingual instruction, stronger identity safeguards, and a reliable system to verify a worker's certification status. It increases civil penalties for violations and creates stronger consequences when repeated reckless or knowing failures to follow fire and building safety requirements result in serious injury or death. It also directs the state to establish a system for recording and publicly reporting noncompliance, giving regulators, property owners and the public better information about violations. These provisions are not intended to cast blame on responsible workers or businesses that follow the rules. They're intended to clearly define safe and compliant work, create meaningful incentives to follow those standards, and ensure accountability when dangerous violations put lives at risk. These responsibilities in this enforcement will now be carried out in memory of Lieutenant Walsh and firefighter Kennedy. And because their families refused to let this work fade with time, their families kept their legacies alive not only through remembrance, but through action. They returned to the State House, told their stories and asked us to make sure another family would not endure the same loss. The most meaningful way that we can honor Lieutenant Walsh and firefighter Kennedy is not only to remember how they died, but to act on what their deaths have taught us.

I want to thank the Walsh and Kennedy families for their strength, persistence and commitment over these many years. I also want to thank the professional firefighters in Massachusetts, Boston firefighters, local 718 and everyone who stayed with this effort. From the Commission room to the Senate floor. I also want to thank my colleagues for their support in seeing this legislation to the finish line. Today, more than 12 years after the fire on Beacon Street, we have completed and will complete an important piece of work that will better protect workers, firefighters and neighborhoods across the Commonwealth. We do so in the names of Edward Walsh and Michael Kennedy, and in recognition of the families who made sure their legacies would lead to lasting change. I ask that this legislation be approved today by my colleagues and thank the Senate President again for prioritizing this in this session.

In his spare time, Chuck was an avid golfer, an enjoyer of his bourbon and cigars, and watched anything to do with sports. Though above, Chuck loved and treasured his family more than anything else in the world.

Chuck leaves behind his beloved wife Donna, his father Charles J. Moitoza, Sr., and his devoted children: Shannon Pina and her husband Rurark, Brittany Moitoza and her partner Johnny Stroud, Cameron Moitoza and his wife Alexandra, Evan Moitoza, Sr. and his wife Amanda, Dawson Moitoza, Francisco Escribano, Jazmyn Moitoza, and Antoni Escribano.

Chuck was the cherished grandfather of Marquise, Rowen, Mila, Noah, Gavin, Daxton, Vincente, and Evan, Jr. He was the dear brother of Richard Moitoza and his wife Lisa, Rosemary Marques and her husband Tony, and the much-loved son-in-law of Annette Waite and the late Russell Waite, and the brother-in-law of Karen Waite and Russel Waite.

Chuck will be sorely missed by his family, friends, colleagues and all who knew and loved him. His loss leaves a void in the Norton community that will be difficult to fill; however, his legacy of service to the Norton community will undoubtedly be felt for generations to come.

May Chuck's memory live on through the athletes he coached, his contributions as a selectman, and his unending love for his family.
