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The Asian American Commission (AAC) is a Massachusetts Commission established under section 68 of chapter 3 of the Massachusetts General Laws, which went into effect on October 29, 2006. The AAC was formed in recognition of the General Court's findings that Asian Americans constitute the fastest growing minority population in both the Commonwealth and the United States, that they represent a diverse population within the Commonwealth, and that many members of the Asian American community have overcome great hardship and made outstanding contributions to the educational, economic, technological, and cultural well-being of the Commonwealth, but still face many challenges in their efforts for full social, economic, and political integration within the Commonwealth.

The AAC is a permanent body dedicated to advocacy on behalf of Asian Americans throughout Massachusetts. The Commission's goal is to recognize and highlight the vital contributions of Asian Americans to the social, cultural, economic, and political life of the Commonwealth; to identify and address the needs and challenges facing residents of Asian ancestry; and to promote the well-being of this dynamic and diverse community, thereby advancing the interests of all persons who call Massachusetts home.

MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



The year 2019 marks the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Asian American Commission's (AAC) 13th year in the community and my second year with the AAC. This year has been historic for the Commission; we expanded our staffing capacity for the first time in history, elected a geographically and ethnically diverse executive leadership team, and invested resources to further engage with AAPI communities in Western Massachusetts.

This report highlights AAC's staple programming throughout the year, including the Eighth Annual Young Leaders Symposium, the Fourth Annual Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) Civil Rights Forum, and the Thirteenth Annual Unity Dinner. The AAC is especially grateful to the State Treasurer's office for housing the AAC over the years. I'm excited for what's ahead of us and honored to continue carrying on the legacy of the AAC.

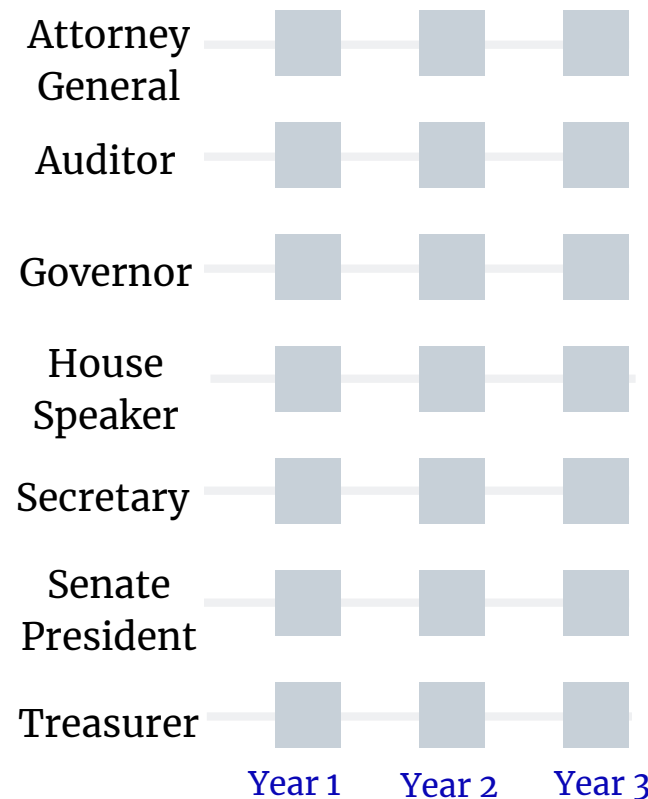

Commissioners are appointed by the following appointing authorities: Attorney General, Auditor, Governor, House Speaker, Secretary, Senate President, and Treasurer. Each may appoint three individuals for a total of 21 Commissioners.

At the end of each year, Commissioners' terms will expire. They may be renewed or be replaced. Each Commissioner is limited to two consecutive terms with a maximum of six years of service. Commissioners who have served the max term may be on holdover until a replacement is appointed. This staggered system ensures that many have the opportunity to serve.

Nominations for members are solicited by the appointing authorities and the Commission from August 1 to September 16 of each year. Appointments are ultimately decided by the seven appointing authorities.

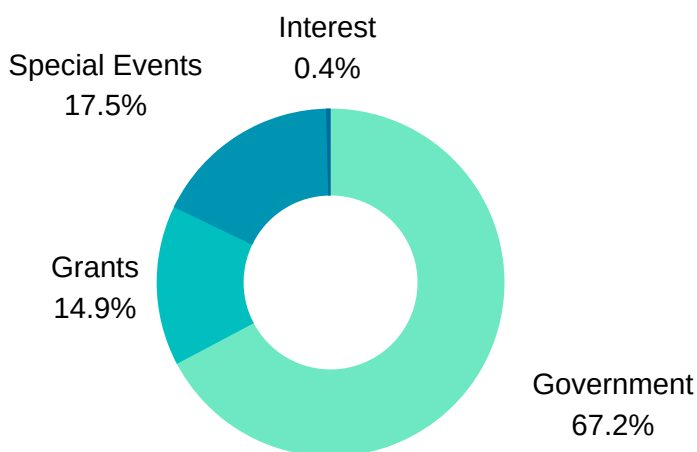

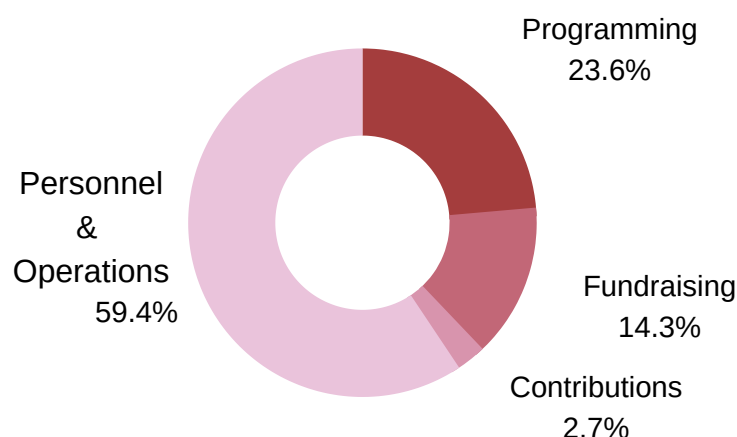

The 4th Annual Asian American Pacific Islander (AAPI) Civil Rights Forum was held on Tuesday, October 29 at the Federal Reserve Plaza in Boston.

We welcomed over 280 participants and offered 15 different panels on critical issues affecting AAPI communities.

We were honored to welcome our keynote speakers Co-Dean David Lopez of Rutgers University, Natasha Warikoo of Harvard Graduate School of Education, and Asian American actor Christopher Sean. During lunch, we honored our two Unsung Hero awardees, State Representative Tackey Chan and Dr. Elisa Choi for their dedication and passionate work serving AAPI communities.

Each year, our goal is to bring together Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders from all across the Commonwealth to enjoy a day of learning, networking, and connecting with other AAPIs who are creating change in their communities, and raise awareness of other prominent issues that affect AAPI communities.



FINANCIAL LITERACY



On Wednesday, March 27, the AAC partnered with East West Bank in Chinatown to kick off a series of financial literacy workshops offered for free to the community. The kickoff event featured guest speaker Justin Kang, Vice President of Economic Growth for the Greater Boston Chamber of Commerce. Attendees were able to schedule individual meetings with a Small Business Administration (SBA) Officer to learn more about starting their own business.

SMALL BUSINESS

In partnership with the US Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC), the AAC hosted two workshops in Lowell and Springfield designed help small business owners and managers focus on running a successful business. Studies have shown that complaints of employment discrimination can lead to morale issues in the workplace and negatively impact creativity and productivity. The workshop covered topics including anti-discrimination statutes, affirmative action for private businesses that receive federal funds, workplace safety standards, and wage and hour.



US CENSUS



The AAC Legislative Committee hosted a job fair in Malden for citizens to apply for positions with the 2020 Census. The U.S. Census Bureau is recruiting to fill thousands of positions across the country looking to hire a diverse workforce to assist with an accurate count in the 2020 Census. Representatives from the US Census Bureau were present to help individuals apply for jobs and answer questions about the Census.
