

- Lea Club/Black Student Alliance/ Rainbow Club/Neurodivergent Club/many more





Advancing Equity

"Massachusetts... can't overcome enrollment challenges without addressing persistent opportunity gaps identified by race, gender, and ZIP code... By 2032, the number of Latinx students graduating from Massachusetts high schools will represent one-quarter of the potential college-going student population, up from the current 6%... And while 74% of Latinx students graduate and 61% enroll in college, only 32% of those who start at a public college or university ever graduate from a post-secondary institution." (Commissioner Santiago, 2019)



Legislative Support is Critical

"The prevalence of significant and sustained opportunity and achievement gaps is one of the areas where the State is profoundly deficient. By simply focusing on postsecondary attainment, inequities faced by students of color and marginalized communities are often ignored. Likewise, it will be impossible for Massachusetts to surpass its current attainment goal if the opportunity gaps between Black and Brown students and their White peers are not closed. The data...reflect some of the gaps leading to the unfortunate conclusion that, even in a state like Massachusetts that is so proud of its educational accomplishments, a student's station in life prospects for the future are determined largely by one's zip code and race."


