



February 2025 ADP: All Counties & MA DOC






Sheriffs' Offices Population: 2019-2025






Total Admissions: 2019-2024






Substance Use: 56% Average





SMI: 42% Average





Summary of Sheriffs' Populations and Budgets

- 173% more admissions;
- 174% more releases;
- @2,000 more incarcerated individuals;
- With an 8.5% smaller budget than the DOC;
- Of that population, 56% have an identified substance use disorder;
- 42% are self reporting to be experiencing mental illness; with an estimated 42% having co-occurring disorders


Programming

- The Program Dashboard was created in response to the CJR of 2018 to display participation and completion of evidence-based and rehabilitative programming
 - Additionally, each Sheriff's line item requires a comprehensive inventory of all current programs and practice
- The MSA expanded on these mandates, creating a matrix of Comprehensive Programs, Services, Interventions, and Community Reinvestments (PSI)
 - This annual matrix includes detailed descriptions of these programs, intended outcomes, persons served, data collected, strategic partners, costs, and more

Sheriffs Provide Community-Centered, Cost-Effective Treatment

- Sheriffs' facilities were designed and constructed during an era that prioritized detention over rehabilitation
 - 1990s: Carceral Environment Tough on Crime
 - 2018: Criminal Justice Reform Act
- As the societal model has shifted, Sheriffs have been innovators in repurposing formerly crowded and chaotic housing areas into restorative and programming-focused environments
 - Intersection of Public Safety and Public Health Model



Sheriffs Provide Community-Centered, Cost-Effective Treatment

Spotlight: Suffolk County's Project Evolve

- A first in the nation approach to treatment-focused detention, supported by a partnership with Boston Medical Center to prioritize care and treatment
- Emergency room and teaching hospital model
- This partnership has transformed the carceral model to one of communitybased treatment and support
- Addresses the increasing acuity of the population afflicted with substance use disorders, mental health, and trauma
- A National Model for Peer-to-Peer Learning



II – How do the Sheriffs Ensure That They Provide Safe & Humane Facilities for Incarcerated Persons?

- Sheriffs' facilities reflect their communities

III — How do the Sheriffs Preserve Flexibility to Respond in a Cost-Effective Manner to Changes in Incarceration Levels?

Sheriffs Continually Maintain a Nimble Response Based on Societal & Environmental Priorities

- Population level is not primary driver of fixed costs
 - Needs of the population
 - Programming
 - Food, electricity, gas, payroll (+20% in 5 years)
- Not only have Sheriffs continually adapted to shifting landscapes within an evolving public safety environment, but they have also been instrumental in shaping reductions in levels of incarceration
 - Turning housing units into public safety/public health models
 - Two regional Evaluation and Stabilization Units for increased mental health needs (Middlesex & Hampden)
 - Suffolk dedicating 25%+ of usable space to behavioral health



Sheriffs Continually Maintain a Nimble Response Based on Societal & Environmental Priorities

COVID-19 Impact

- Within 48 hours, Hampden stood up a Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) manufacturing facility providing masking and safety garments to facilities across the state
 - First Responder Recovery Center
- Hard work prevented severe loss of life as seen in other areas
- Courts closed, requiring Sheriffs' facilities to set up virtual court houses
- Dedicating housing units for quarantine and triage
- Continued mental health treatments and maintained family ties (via Zoom)



IV – How do the Sheriffs Recognize the Importance of Evidence-Based Rehabilitative Programming for Incarcerated Persons?

Evidence-Based Rehabilitative Programming Begins on Day One in Sheriffs' Facilities

- Evidence-based rehabilitative programming begins on Day One to improve outcomes
 - Program fidelity equals an allegiance to success
 - Full transparency of program offerings available in PSI Matrix as displayed on the <u>Cross-Tracking Program Dashboard</u>
- Sheriffs are national leaders on Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) for Substance Use Disorder
 - We are the first state where all Sheriffs' Offices provide all forms of Medicated Assisted
 Treatment (MAT) where available combined with Behavioral Health Treatment
 - Barnstable County: First in MA and 2nd in US to provide Injectable Naltrexone
 - Franklin County: First in MA and US for rural as an OTP provider
 - Middlesex County: Recognized by DOJ as a Center of Innovation for MAT
 - Essex, Hampden, Franklin, Middlesex all Peer-to-Peer Learning Sites for DOJ
 - And the list of firsts goes on and on.....



Sheriffs Provide Tailored Programming Based on Populations' Needs

- Sheriffs provide gender-specific, evidence-based, and trauma-informed programming for:
 - Men
 - Women
 - Emerging Adults
 - Older Adults (age 55+)
 - Veterans
 - LGBTQI+
 - ...and more
- Sheriffs have become an important factor in education (HiSET, College Courses) by providing opportunity to continue learning
- Standardized risk/needs intake instruments and assessments to determine programming for successful reentry and outcome improvement




Spotlight: Middlesex Older Adult Re-Entry (OAR) Unit

- Launched March 21, 2025
- With assistance from academic partners from Boston University and UMass Boston, extensive research and planning paved the way to create this first-in-thenation unit developed to support incarcerated men ages 55 and older
 - In Middlesex, approximately 10% of people incarcerated are 55+, an increase of nearly 5% over a one-decade timespan
- Specialized and mandatory treatment programs are focused on the specific needs of this aging population, including cognitive behavioral treatment, education, social enrichment, and occupational therapy
 - The dorm-style layout for the OAR unit is also customized with those 55+ in mind




Spotlight: Dedicated Emerging Adult Units & Programming

- Hampden County's Meaningful Accomplishments Gain Increased Character (M.A.G.I.C.) Unit
 - Intensive intervention and specialized program unit for ages 18-24
 - Includes mentorship, youth-targeted programming, incentives and structure designed to promote success, address needs, and reduce risk of the emerging adult population
- Middlesex County's People Achieving Change Together (P.A.C.T.) Unit
 - First-of-its-kind unit in the nation with programming designed to reduce recidivism among incarcerated young adults aged 18-24
- Suffolk County's Positive Energy that Always Creates Elevation (P.E.A.C.E.) Unit
 - Specialized treatment housing program focused on providing a therapeutic space for incarcerated men ages 18-25





Berkshire County's Aquaponics facility


- Northeast of the correctional facility is a first-of-its-kind aquaponics lab that focuses on the science of raising fish and plants in a symbiotic ecosystem
 - It combines an educational curriculum with hands-on vocational experience in running the facility
- Since its inception, hundreds of thousands of fully organic lettuce has been donated back to the community

Bristol County's Expansion of Educational Services

- Partnerships with local colleges to offer credit toward a general education Bachelor's Degree
- Students who earn a B+ or better are eligible for automatic admission to UMass (tuition-free for families earning \$75k or less)
 - Courses include Math, Biology, Sociology, Anthropology, Literature and Social Justice, Journalism, Greek Mythology, Archaeology, Imagining Justice, and College Writing

A 4-week course where incarcerated individuals are taught the baics of baking breads and pastries. The course teaches marketable skills that can help the students earn income and rebuild their lives upon release.

Bristol County's Commercial Driver's License (CDL) Course

 Incarcerated individuals attend CDL Driving School in the community where they study to obtain CDL permits, participate in parking lot and on-the-road driving lessons, and the road test to obtain their CDL license

Hampden County's Arborist Apprenticeship Program (AAP)

 Designed to develop members of minimum-security population into job-ready Tree Care Specialist candidates, using a combination of technical knowledge, hands-on training, and industry-specific job readiness preparation



V – What is the Value of Community-Integrated Reentry Support Services?

The Frederick Douglass Project for Justice



The project connects community members with incarcerated individuals to talk and learn from each other during structured conversations. It fosters learning and ignites a mutual transformation that enriches lives and reshapes our broader community. The Project is currently offered at 22 jails and prisons in 15 states.







Community-Integrated Reentry Support Services are Vital to Improving Outcomes

Berkshire County's Second Street Second Chances

- Unique re-entry program that partners with a local non-profit
- Brings an array of resources under one roof to help those recently released with housing needs, work placement, educational programs, support groups, mental health counseling, legal aid, food vulnerability, and transportation

Norfolk County's H.O.P.E. Center

- Opened in April 2024
- One-stop shop for those formerly incarcerated or anyone in the community
- Each client receives a personalized plan for success and support needed to achieve individual goals
 - Basic needs, peer support groups, education and employment assistance



Community-Integrated Reentry Support Services are Vital to Improving Outcomes

Hampden County's All-Inclusive Support Services (AISS)


- Created in 1996 and has served 30,000+ formerly justice-involved individuals
- AISS is the bridge that carries the positive momentum begun during incarceration forward and assists individuals in the reentry process
 - Addiction, mental health, identifying documents, employment, finances, education, housing, and more

Essex County's Supporting Transitions And Reentry (STAR) Program

- Community-based, referral program geared toward reducing recidivism in partnership with the courts, corrections, and community
- STAR provides an evidence-based curriculum by identifying a person's strengths and weaknesses to help develop a treatment plan
 - STAR Navigator (case manager) develops an individualized program for each participant and works with community partners to provide the tools and services they need

VI – What are the Advantages of Local Facilities for Pretrial Confinement & Short Incarcerations?

Local Facilities for Pretrial Confinement & Short Incarcerations Keep Individuals in Their Communities

Zip Code Model

- Community providers are coming into facilities and providing care to the individuals who are returning to their communities (same zip code)
- Facilitates smooth transition back into community
- Family reunification
- Substance use and behavioral health counseling resources available
- Job, housing, behavioral health, mental health, transportation, continuation of services
- EVOLVE Unit-BMC sees the same individuals in their ER's as they do in the Jail. Improving continuity of care and the compassion of recognizing "familiar faces"



VII – What are the Advantages of Local Facilities in Supporting Family & Community Connections?

Local Facilities Supporting Family & Community Connections Keep Individuals & Their Families Closer to Home

Barnstable County's Family Outreach Resource & Support Services (FORSS)

- Helps relatives navigate the incarceration process and connects families with community services
- Provides a liaison to answer general questions about bail, sentence structure, programming, housing, visits, and more

Middlesex County's Family Support Services Unit

- The first of its kind....a national model....
- Correctional staff to respond to inquiries, requests, and concerns by family members
- Engages families through proactive outreach and education about rules and policies regarding visits, mail and telephone contact



Middlesex County's Family Support Services Unit

"I have been meaning to write this email for a couple of months now - but better late than never. I just wanted to say a big thank you for all your support while my son Zachary was in Billerica. This was an extremely traumatic experience for my family and having you to help guide us made it so much more bearable. I really appreciated your quick responses to my questions and that you were able to help with things like getting him his court suit delivered. He's only 18 and not through high school yet, so dealing with the administrative details of forms and processes is not yet a strength of his and so having you to help us navigate everything was very helpful. And just having someone to call who could get information on what his current situation was, was very consoling. Zach came home to us and we are so very grateful. VIII – How do the Sheriffs Utilize the Value of Existing Facilities & Other Investments?

Sheriffs are Constantly Adapting Facilities to Accommodate the Changing Needs of Their Evolving Populations

- Sheriffs' facilities are modern, humane, & more conducive to a public safety/public health model
- Our facilities are under a preventative maintenance program; most operable and functional of correctional institutions in the Commonwealth
 - Strong partnership with DCAMM
- Facilities have modified space to provide:
 - Regional Lock Ups with wrap-around services
 - Evaluation & Stabilization Units
 - Behavioral/mental health needs
 - Dedicated women's centers
 - Areas for vocational training and education
- Creative uses include leasing open bed space or houses/non-state-owned beds
 - Hampshire's Bridge to the Future is a leased dwelling off the main campus



Spotlight: Worcester's Substance Treatment Opportunity Program (S.T.O.P.)

- In 2023, Worcester County Sheriff's Office introduced the Substance Treatment
 Opportunity Program (S.T.O.P.)
- S.T.O.P is a state-of-the-art treatment facility located in a converted medium security bunk-style housing unit
 - Modified therapeutic community environment with dormitory-style living, classrooms, and meeting spaces
 - Six-month, intensive Substance Use Disorder treatment program accommodating up to 24 incarcerated individuals
 - Participants must apply to S.T.O.P. and remain in good standing

X – What Unique Roles do the Sheriffs Have in Varying Urban & Rural Regions?

Sheriffs Specialize in Serving the Varying Populations of Urban & Rural Regions Across the Commonwealth

- Sheriffs are integral parts of the communities they serve
 - Best equipped and most familiar with the unique and varying landscapes of their communities to complement existing treatment environments
- Countless community service centers in each of the 14 counties
- Critical services delivered to communities:
 - Housing
 - Work assistance
 - Mental Health
 - Substance use disorder treatment
- Remaining connected throughout the process builds trust and relationships



Urban Examples

Suffolk County

- As Suffolk is so close to other bordering counties, we have several men and women with cases in multiple jurisdictions, making discharge planning more challenging
- Housing is a problem across the Commonwealth, however there is a larger challenge within a major metropolitan city
 - Limited access to dry shelters
 - For the many that suffer from substance use, it is hard to maintain one's recovery in a space where people are actively using, especially when a shelter is your only housing option

Norfolk County

- The Norfolk County Sheriff's Office has safekeep agreements in place with the Massachusetts State Police, Hanscom Air Force Base, and over 80% of local police departments to hold their detainees
- Provide Special Response Teams to local police departments
- Members of METRO-LEC regional response team




Rural Examples

Dukes County

- Regional Lockup serves as the only holding cells on the island for the 6 island police departments, state police, and Edgartown District, Superior, and Probate Courts
- Without the Dukes County Sheriff's Office, no arrests would be made on the island, and the courts would have nowhere to hold individuals in secure custody
 - Including protective custody detainees


What is the Women's Therapeutic Treatment Program (WTTP)?

The Barnstable County Correctional Facility houses women from Barnstable County, Dukes County, Nantucket County, and Essex County. In order to ensure successful re-entry for our incarcerated females, the Barnstable County Sheriff's Office created a Women's Therapeutic Treatment Program (WTTP). The WTTP is designed to address criminal and addictive behaviors, reduce recidivism, and promote community safety using gender-responsive strategies. 




Spotlight: Western Massachusetts Regional Women's Correctional Center (WCC)

Sheriffs Focus Programming & Reentry Services on Addressing Social Determinants of Health

- Sheriffs bridge the gap upon reentry providing the tools and resources needed to improve overall health outcomes with the goal of eliminating recidivism
 - Individuals meet with reentry teams within 72 hours of admission
- Focus on reintegration
 - Education, job training, affordable housing, health care access, and social support services
 - Prepare individuals for successful release into their communities
- 24/7 medical, behavioral health, and substance use care
 - MAT
- MIEP Reentry Demonstration
 - National Leaders
 - 4th State in the US to be approved for a Medicaid Waiver allowing Medicaid eligible incarcerated individuals, regardless of status, to receive their Federal Medicaid Benefits 90 days prior to release.
 - In collaboration with MassHealth, EOPSS and MSA, this initiative will help to enhance and expand health outcomes. Exciting and we are very proud.



Spotlight: Plymouth County Sheriff's Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI)

- The Plymouth County Sheriff's BCI assists local law enforcement, the State Police, the FBI, and other counties with technical aspects of their investigations
- BCI Deputies work in the field collecting evidence; taking photographs and fingerprints at crime scenes and traffic accidents
 - Perform over 10,000 crime scene investigations annually
- BCI consists of 15 full-time deputies, a crime lab, and H.E.A.T. Unit that works
 with electronic or digital evidence obtained by investigators from suspects' hard
 drives, phones, and cameras for recovery and analysis
 - Lab is accredited in "Forensic Testing and Calibration" by ANSI National Accreditation Board
