Report to the Governor and General Court FY25



Introduction

Massachusetts's network of legal aid organizations is a point of pride for the Commonwealth—and MLAC is proud to be the largest funder of civil legal aid in the state, thanks to the Legislature's commitment to investing in these vital programs.

In FY25, MLAC received \$51 million to fund civil legal aid through state budget line item 0321-1600. MLAC distributed that funding to 16 legal aid organizations across the Commonwealth. MLAC also received \$2.5 million through state budget line item 0321-1800 to fund the Access to Counsel Program. In addition, MLAC received money from Interest on Lawyers' Trust Accounts (IOLTA) funds, government grants, and private foundations. Altogether, in FY25 MLAC distributed \$72,589,416 in grants to 20 legal aid organizations across Massachusetts.

Our grantees solved critical problems for people with low incomes facing housing instability, wage theft, domestic abuse, consumer fraud, loss of income or affordable medical care, and other areas of civil legal need. Individuals and families at or below 125% of the federal poverty level qualify for legal aid. In 2025, that is \$40,187 per year for a family of four, and \$19,562 for an individual.

Left unresolved, many civil legal issues can lead to costly public expenditures such as emergency shelter and homelessness services. Civil legal aid protects people's rights and access to basic needs, and it saves money by addressing issues before they become more complex problems. It also helps families access federally-funded income supports (including SNAP, veterans benefits, Social Security benefits, and more).

Legal aid organizations are deeply invested in their communities. They provide training and guidance to community health centers, homeless shelters, domestic violence organizations, and other organizations. They also leverage the legal community's expertise, working with law schools and private pro bono attorneys to expand capacity.

In FY25, legal aid attorneys and staff helped more than 98,900 people by handling more than 46,890 civil legal cases. What follows in this report details the tremendous impact Massachusetts's investment in civil legal aid had on our neighbors and communities by advancing equal access to justice for all.

MLAC Basics and Background

The Massachusetts Legal Assistance Corporation is the largest funding source for civil legal aid in the Commonwealth. MLAC was established by the Commonwealth in 1983 to ensure that people with low incomes facing critical, non-criminal legal problems would have access to legal information, advice, and representation.

MLAC's mission is to provide leadership and support to improve civil legal services to people with low incomes in Massachusetts through collaboration with the legal services community, the public, the bar, and the legislature.

MLAC receives funding from a variety of sources, primarily the state budget and Interest on Lawyers' Trust Accounts (IOLTA) funds, and disburses it to qualified civil legal aid organizations across the Commonwealth.

In FY25, MLAC received revenue from several sources:

- A state appropriation of \$51 million for General Support and \$2.5 million for the Access to Counsel Program
- IOLTA program and related funds of more than \$22.2 million
- Grants and other revenue totaling \$6.7 million

MLAC awarded a total of \$72,589,416 in grants and contracts in FY25.

In addition to funding, MLAC also provides these organizations with support in communications; data and research; engagement and culture; information technology; and program monitoring and evaluation. Detailed financial information, descriptions of the organizations funded, and MLAC's support services to legal aid organizations appear in the following pages.

About Civil Legal Aid

Civil legal aid organizations provide free information, advice, and representation to people with low incomes who otherwise would not receive help with serious legal issues related to housing, health care, immigration, employment, education, family law and domestic violence, disability, consumer benefits, elder issues and more. As mentioned in the Introduction, to be eligible for MLAC-funded legal services in FY25, a household needed to have an annual income at or below 125 percent of the federal poverty level; in 2025, that equates to \$19,562 for an individual and \$40,187 for a family of four.

Although the U.S. Constitution and the Massachusetts Constitution guarantee most criminal defendants a right to counsel, most people in civil cases do not have that right. That's true even though the consequences of civil cases can be severe; people can lose their homes, health, safety, family, and financial stability—without ever having spoken to a lawyer.

Civil legal aid seeks to ensure that all residents of Massachusetts have access to a lawyer and equal access to justice.

Cases handled by the **Domestic Violence Legal Assistance Project: 1,481**


These cases address physical safety, child custody and support, and health care coverage.


CASES CLOSED FY25



Client Demographics


Race

Ethnicity







Legal Aid Organizations MLAC Funds

MLAC uses state-appropriated funds (under line item 0321-1600) to support two different types of civil legal aid organizations: regional and statewide.

REGIONAL ORGANIZATIONS

Regional organizations help people from a particular geographic area resolve a variety of civil legal problems related to housing, health care, unemployment insurance, public benefits, immigration, domestic violence, and other serious issues.

- Community Legal Aid, with offices in Worcester, Northampton, Pittsfield, Springfield, and Fitchburg, serves Central and Western Massachusetts.
- De Novo Center for Justice and Healing, based in Cambridge, serves Boston, Cambridge, and interior suburbs of Boston.
- **Greater Boston Legal Services**, with offices in Boston and Cambridge, serves the Greater Boston area.
- **MetroWest Legal Services**, based in Framingham, serves the MetroWest region.
- Northeast Legal Aid, with offices in Lawrence, Lowell, and Lynn, serves Essex and Northern Middlesex Counties.
- South Coastal Counties Legal Services, with offices in New Bedford, Fall River, Brockton, and Hyannis, serves Cape Cod, the Islands, and Southeastern Massachusetts.



STATEWIDE ORGANIZATIONS

Statewide organizations specialize in specific subjects or types of law and serve people across the Commonwealth. They also provide support to regional organizations.

- Center for Law and Education strives to make the right of all students to quality education a reality and to help communities address their own education problems effectively, with an emphasis on assistance to low-income students.
- Center for Public Representation is dedicated to enforcing and expanding the rights of people with disabilities and others who are in segregated settings.
- Children's Law Center of Massachusetts advocates for the rights of young people across Massachusetts.
- **Disability Law Center** is the Protection and Advocacy agency for Massachusetts, protecting the rights of people with disabilities.
- Massachusetts Advocates for Children represents children, students, and youth who face significant barriers because of their economic status, disability, race, ethnicity/culture, immigration status, language, and/or traumatic life experiences.
- Massachusetts Law Reform Institute provides statewide advocacy and leadership in advancing laws, policies, and practices that secure economic, racial, and social justice for people with low incomes and their communities.
- National Consumer Law Center advises on a variety of consumer law issues, including student loans, debt collection, disaster protection, mortgages, and consumer protection.
- Political Asylum/Immigration Representation (PAIR) Project provides legal services to asylum seekers and promotes the rights of detained immigrants.
- **Prisoners' Legal Services** protects the health and civil rights of people who are incarcerated in Massachusetts.
- **Veterans Legal Services** promotes the self-sufficiency, stability, and financial security of veterans with low incomes and those who are unhoused.

Specialized Funding for Victims of Crime and Other Vulnerable Populations

Civil Legal Aid for Victims of Crime

The Civil Legal Aid for Victims of Crime (CLAVC) initiative helps victims of crime throughout Massachusetts with their related civil legal problems—including family law, housing, immigration, disability rights, child welfare, education, consumer issues, identity theft, employment rights, and public benefits. Crime victims often experience difficult legal problems that cannot be addressed in the criminal law system. For example, a victim of an assault may be unable to work, leading to financial distress, including an eviction and debt collection problems. Or, a survivor of domestic violence may need legal help to get a divorce and child support. Jane Doe, Inc. and the National Consumer Law Center provide training and support. MLAC and the Massachusetts Law Reform Institute also provide training, support, and overall CLAVC project coordination. CLAVC is (partially) supported by the Massachusetts Office for Victim Assistance through state bridge funds, and/or a Victims of Crime Act of 1984 (VOCA) grant from the Office for Victims of Crime, Office of Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice, and/or the Human Trafficking and Drunk Driving Trust Funds. In FY25, the initiative awarded more than \$2.6 million to ten civil legal aid organizations which provide direct legal services to victims of crime.

Massachusetts Immigration Legal Assistance Fund

In 2019, an anonymous donor provided MLAC with funding to create the Massachusetts Immigration Legal Assistance Fund (MILAF). The purpose of this fund is to help legal aid organizations respond to persistent, unmet legal needs among immigrant and refugee populations in the Commonwealth. MILAF provides funding to organizations that work to fill the gaps within services to immigrants, refugees, and asylum seekers. MILAF protects the rights of immigrants facing legal crises so they can pursue a stable future. In FY25, the fund awarded \$625,000 to 13 organizations. To date, the fund has awarded over \$5.2 million.

Three philanthropic partners provided funding for MLAC to create a program to assist Afghan refugees in filing and completing their legal status applications and resolutions in the Greater Boston area. Additional support was received from two resettlement agencies to fund five dedicated attorneys for this project. In FY24, the Afghan Refugee Project granted \$360,000 to three legal aid organizations. To date, the fund has distributed over \$1.4 million.

Strengthening the Legal Aid Network

In addition to operating funds, MLAC provides supportive services to its grantees in the following areas:

Central Technology Project

The Central Technology Project team at MLAC works to optimize and standardize technology for legal aid organizations to promote efficiency and ultimately improve the client experience. The Technology team also provides Help Desk support and training to legal aid staff and manages the organizations' hardware, software, telephone and internet services, video conferencing, and networks.

Communications

MLAC's Communications team supports organizational priorities through messaging and content creation. The team oversees MLAC's website and social media channels, where it promotes awareness of civil legal aid. Additionally, MLAC Communications supports MLAC grantees by convening regular meetings for communications and publishes a quarterly email newsletter.

Data and Analysis

MLAC's Data team employs sophisticated tools and analysis to support informed decision-making at MLAC, its grantees, and its funders. The team collects and analyzes a wide range of information about the legal aid organizations funded by MLAC, the clients they serve, and the low-income population of Massachusetts. With that data, the team reports on the legal aid workforce (e.g., workforce diversity, areas of practice, language ability, and experience) and the impact the workforce is having on behalf of people with low incomes (e.g., improved safety, health, income, housing, and more). The team then recommends new goals and strategies for addressing current and emerging legal needs. The Data team strives to fulfill its mission effectively while promoting transparency and trust.

Engagement and Culture

MLAC improves services to legal aid clients by building cultural competence among staff as well as promoting equality and inclusion within MLAC and the civil legal aid organizations it funds. Through education and training, improved hiring practices, statewide events, and collaboration, this initiative spurs legal aid organizations to exemplify our shared values of justice and fairness.

Equal Justice Coalition

The Equal Justice Coalition (EJC) works with the Massachusetts Bar Association and the Boston Bar Association to expand access to civil legal aid for Massachusetts residents with low incomes. The EJC includes bar associations, law firms, law schools, and other legal professionals who advocate to protect and increase the state appropriation for civil legal aid. The EJC engages in year-round legislative advocacy and organizes a "Walk to the Hill" each January.

Grants

MLAC's Grants team manages all incoming and outgoing grants and oversees an online Grants Portal supporting grant application, contracting, budgeting, and reporting. The team works with grantees to ensure adherence with all state and federal requirements and MLAC policies through regular monitoring and technical assistance.

Program Evaluation

MLAC conducts periodic evaluations of its grantees using a thorough, time-tested peer review model that engages attorneys and other professionals skilled in organizational development and legal aid service delivery. Performance standards are drawn from the American Bar Association's Standards for the Delivery of Civil Legal Services.

Client Story

Civil Legal Aid Helps Resilient Mom Keep Her Family Safe

Lizbeth Valerio-Green is a successful businesswoman and single mom of two. Her legal aid story is one of perseverance, strength, and determination in the face of difficulty.

Lizbeth's ex-husband abused her physically, psychologically, and economically. Once he banged her head so hard, she knew she had to get help. After that incident, Lizbeth obtained a restraining order against her ex, but he defied the order and she had no choice but to take herself and her young children to a homeless shelter for safety.

Lizbeth called her local legal aid office and connected with a Family Law attorney. With patience and persistence, the attorney helped Lizbeth divorce her abusive ex-husband and ensure the continued protection of the children. Lizbeth went on to become a certified medical and legal interpreter, and recently got her real estate license while working towards her Associate's degree. In January 2025, Lizbeth spoke at the Equal Justice Coalition's "Walk to the Hill"lobby day for civil legal aid at the Massachusetts State House.
