

Economic Benefits of EU-US Cooperation on eHealth

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Healthcare costs constantly growing component of public finances

Total public & private health spending

Up to 9.6% of GDP

Total public health spending

***7.4% of GDP**

Up to 15% of total government expenditure

Shrinking workforce in the care sector by 2020

1 million doctors & nurses less, and 2 mio incl. ancillary staff

***15% of necessary care uncovered**



Demographic Change in the EU 2010-60

65+ Population increasing from 17% to 30%

Working age contingent (15-64) decreasing from 67% to 56%



Care of the Chronically Ill Example - Cardiovasular Disease - CVD

80% of EU spending on healthcare goes on the chronically ill

CVD alone costs the EU Economy €192 billion annually and accounts for 57% of healthcare costs

Contributes to 21% of productivity losses and 42% of deaths in the EU



Benefits of eHealth

eHealth and ICT for well-being have potential to deliver more efficient care:

- help reduce errors
- foster a citizen-centric approach
- aid social inclusion
- promote market growth
- help to reduce waste



Benefits of eHealth

Tele-health services and interoperable EHRs can play huge role in safer and better quality healthcare

Deployment of eHealth is an important part of implementation of the Digital Single Market in the EU

Economists consider health to be a component of human capital or 'health capital'



Evidence of the cost-effectiveness of eHealth in several EU Member States



Overall savings from eHealth are estimated at around 12,4 billion € (i.e. 11,7% of NHS expenditure).

Savings from digital prescriptions alone are estimated at around <u>2 billion \in </u> (i.e. 1,84% of NHS expenditure) with savings for each prescription between 1 and 1,5 \in .



United Kingdom

<u>Whole System Demonstrator project</u> (preliminary results):Telehealth can deliver a 14% reduction in bed days and an <u>8% reduction in tariff costs</u>.

In 2010-2011, NHS Direct services, a 24 hour telephone advice line, <u>saved 1.6 million unnecessary</u> <u>appointments with GPs as well as 1.6 million</u> <u>unnecessary ambulance journeys</u> and visits to accident and emergency departments.

The <u>gross value</u> of the Scottish Telecare Development Programme funded <u>efficiencies</u> over <u>the period 2006-</u> <u>10 is approximately 77.5 million €.</u>



More than 80% of all prescriptions are transferred from the doctor to the pharmacy electronically via a health extranet, Sjunet, or through web-based prescribing.

The cumulative benefits were estimated at €330 (\$430) million, distributed between citizens (20%) and hospitals (80%).





Danish Health Data Network provides fast and efficient communication between patients, general practitioners and social care professionals.

This streamlined services for patients and healthcare workers leads to cumulative savings of €92 million per year.



Some other EU countries

A recent study across the Netherlands, UK and Germany showed that introducing home tele-monitoring systems could bring a 26% reduction in hospital days per patient, make 10% overall cost savings through nurse telephone support while improving survival rates by 15%.



EU and US Common Interest in eHealth/health IT

EU and US facing common challenges in delivery of healthcare

Both recognise the importance of healthrelated ICT in promoting individual and community health while <u>promoting</u> <u>innovation and economic growth</u>

Mutual economic interest in collaboration on eHealth/health IT



EU-US MoU on eHealth

Aims to foster mutual understanding of challenges faced by both sides in advancing the effective use of eHealth/health IT

Initially collaboration will focus on interoperability and standards for EHRs and the development of skilled health IT workforces



Activities under the MoU – Road-Map

Development of joint road-map with key milestones for MoU activities over the next 12 to 18 months
